Back-to-School Information

First Day of School: The first day of school for K-12 students was Thursday, September 5, 2019. Pre-K students started on Friday, September 6, 2019.

Enrollment: Parents of resident students may enroll students at the individual school buildings between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Parents are encouraged to call the school to schedule a time to complete the registration.

Immunizations: Vaccination Requirements Applicable to ALL Students Public Health Law §2164, as amended by Chapter 35 of the Laws of 2019, applies to students attending all schools as defined in Public Health Law §2164 to include any public, private or parochial child caring center, day nursery, day care agency, nursery school, kindergarten, elementary, intermediate or secondary schools.

Public Health Law §2164, as amended by Chapter 35 of the Laws of 2019, prohibits a school from permitting any child to be admitted to such school, or to attend such school, in excess of 14 days without sufficient evidence that the child has received all age-appropriate required vaccinations. The 14 days may be extended where the student is transferring from out of state or from another country and can show a good faith effort to get the necessary evidence or where the parent, guardian or any other person in parental relationship can demonstrate that a child has received the first age-appropriate dose in each immunization series and that they have age-appropriate scheduled appointments for follow-up doses to complete the immunization series in accordance with the CDS's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices Recommended Immunization Schedules for Persons Aged 0 through 18.

Students must be fully immunized in order to attend school. For information on immunization clinics, call the Oneida County Health Department at 315-798-5747 or the Madison County Health Department at 315-366-2361.

Transportation: Families are provided transportation information in the mail prior to the beginning of school. All area residents are asked to be alert to students waiting for the bus, walking, or bicycling to school. Please be reminded that it is illegal to pass a stopped school bus from any direction when its red lights are flashing.



Welcome to E.A. McAllister!


Welcome Back!

Summer LEAP Program

The 2019 VVS Summer LEAP program at JD George Elementary was busy, exciting, and a huge success! Our students were excited to come through the doors and be back with our amazing staff for five weeks of fun, creative, educational activities. All of our students enjoyed their breakfast and lunch selections by our cafeteria staff and paid close attention to our rules and routine reminders during our Monday Morning Meetings.

Our K-2 students were quite busy, participating in a wide variety of activities such as "Humpty Dumpty Science" with Ms. Stone. The students predicted what would happen when the Humpty egg was dropped in various materials, designed and built their own egg, and discussed what would keep Humpty safe from various heights. Ms. Farrell and Mrs. Boylan had students work collaboratively using the iPads to code and construct robots made of LEGO bricks. They worked through various STEM based challenges and linked their activities to real-life phenomenon.

In Mrs. Deyo's class, the students read "There was an Old Lady Who Swallowed a Shell" and completed several activities along with it: sequence cards, a mini book "How to Build a Sand Castle," watercolor bookmark surfboards, and sand castle paper bag projects.

Our 3-6 students were just as busy! They really enjoyed getting back into their garden from last summer with Mr. Bonville. They discussed improvements, watched a YouTube video, and cleaned up the old garden as they discussed various decomposers. The students also had to calculate the amount of top soil that needed to be purchased to fill their new raised bed. In the media center with Mrs. Sperber, the students explored funny architecture and designed their own, using websites such as "Roadside Attractions," "Funny Buildings," and "Mimetic Buildings."

In music with Ms. Paige, the students composed "rhythm etudes" using note manipulatives. They made a "chain composition" by taking turns writing one measure for each song, and then performed their chain compositions with instruments! In Spanish class with Senora Viggiano, the students loved their lessons titled "iBienvenidos a México!" The students created colorful sombreros and learned the Mexican Hat Dance, or the "Jarabe Tapatío!" They also used their kitchen skills to make guacamole from scratch, following instructions completely in Spanish.

Thank you to all of the faculty and staff who worked tirelessly to provide our students with such an amazing opportunity for summer enrichment. We look forward to seeing our campers again next year!

Every child is an inventor at VVS Camp Invention! The program this year was called "Supercharged," and over 360 VVS elementary and middle school students learned that invention is much more than a eureka moment. Invention is a process, and moments of failure are necessary on the path to success. Campers met four exciting challenges that required collaboration, hands-on application of science, technology, engineering, the arts, and math, as well as developing skills in creative problem solving and entrepreneurship.

Newfound confidence was gained as our superhero inventors ages 8 to 13 shared some of their prototypes on stage to an auditorium overflowing with family and friends.

Here are some bigblights:

<u>Innovation Force</u>® - Campers teamed up with the Innovation Force, a group of National Inventors Hall of Fame (NIHF) Inductees who have been transformed into superheroes, to battle the evil Plagiarizer, a supervillain who is out to steal the world's ideas. Campers created a device to retrieve the stolen ideas, and they learned about the importance of collaboration and patents.

Deep Sea Mystery[™]- Campers embarked on a research adventure at sea, but soon found themselves stranded on an island. Using lessons and advice from NIHF Inductees, campers worked in teams to invent island-survival tools and underwater equipment and navigate their way back home.

Farm Tech [™]- Campers managed their own farm and learned the basics of running a business. With the assistance of Bot-ANN-E, a programmable robot, campers learned fundamental coding techniques to maximize their time and profits and performed mock DNA experiments to check the health of their cattle.

DIY Orbot™- Campers explored frequency, circuit boards, motors, and gears as they used real tools to reverse engineer a remote-controlled DIY Orbot. Throughout the week, campers adapted their DIY Orbot to perform increasingly challenging tasks from sports to art.

About Those Lights!

The VVS School District and Board of Education is excited to announce that the Sheveron Stadium light poles, which had been brought down for safety reasons this past spring, have been reinstalled.

After a structural issue in the upper portion of the bases and anchor bolts was found last spring, all poles were brought down for testing. With the safety of our students, faculty, staff, and community always being our primary concern, the district worked with numerous organizations to fully assess and resolve the issue.

The district, in cooperation with its architect and construction management firm, contracted with third-party testing firms, as well as a third-party structural engineer, to provide an expert objective assessment and develop a plan to address the failure and reinstall the poles.

Ultimately, the team found and implemented a solution that provided even greater structural integrity. As an added precaution, additional special inspections by third party inspectors and engineers took place throughout the reconstruction process, concrete pours, and fastening of the poles to their foundations. The district appreciates the patience and understanding shown by our community during this process.

All hands were on deck for the final testing of the light, sound, and scoreboard systems, just in time for our first home fall sports contests. The district is excited to continue to provide the same safe and enjoyable player and spectator experience that was enjoyed by all with the opening of Sheveron Stadium last fall.
