Keep Learning, Stay Connected, Take Charge!

Although the 2019-20 school year brought many unexpected challenges, we are very thankful for the way our school community came together during this unique situation. As we reflect, it is clear that there is much to be proud of!

#KeepLearning

As we shifted to remote learning, our faculty and staff found ways to keep online instruction both engaging and relevant for our students. In the high school, teachers shared best practices in a Google digital scrapbook. This allowed our faculty members to stay connected to each other while also learning about the great things their colleagues were implementing!

For instance, Mr. Carr traveled around Central New York (social distancing of course) and took videos for use in Earth Science classes. These virtual field trips connected students directly with the content they were learning in a way that is not always possible during a regular school day. Mr. Domachowske also took many pictures of the blooming spring vegetation to share with science classes.

Señora Viggiano used a real-world "choice board" to keep students using their target language in a relevant manner. Students could choose a task to complete such as watching a movie in Spanish, following a Spanish recipe, texting in Spanish, or changing their phone settings to Spanish.





#StayConnected

While learning occurred outside of the school building, it was our mission to maintain a positive connection with our students and our school community. In order for students to start their day with an inspirational message and a familiar face, the high school began creating and producing daily "Morning Greetings." These Morning Greetings were shared on the high school social media platforms (Facebook and Instagram) as well as on the guidance grade-level Google Classrooms.

Over the course of ten weeks, 48 Morning Greeting videos were shared with our students and the community. These videos featured members of our faculty/staff and also included special guests, such as Tom Murphy from Sweethearts & Heroes and VVS alumnus Staff Sergeant Matthew Stamp. The highlight of these Morning Greetings were the videos which featured our very own VVS high school students! Nine students accepted the challenge of creating and sharing a Morning Greeting message, and we are proud of and impressed by their ability to inspire their peers and our entire community.

#TakeCharge

While learning remotely from their homes, we knew that students would have to shift into the driver's seat of their education. This required them to reflect upon and improve their self-management skills, such as time-management, goal-setting, and self-discipline. It was our goal to support students as they refined these valuable skills and to also acknowledge their achievements. Prior to remote learning, our teachers filled out "Student Shout-Outs" which were displayed in the high school lobby. This positive practice was shifted during remote learning by partnering with the Red Zone School Store to mail 56 students a personalized Shout-Out from a teacher along with a small gift card to a local business for an ice cream treat! We are proud of the way all our students used this challenging time as an opportunity for growth.

As we look toward the 2020-21 school year, we are committed to emphasizing quality instruction and student learning, maintaining and building upon the connections within our school community, and continuing to provide opportunities and support in order to empower students to take ownership of their educational goals. Whether we are



learning remotely, in-person, or a combination of both, these goals continue to be our focus. We will build on the many positives that came out of remote learning and create an environment where all students can be successful.

VVS Camp Invention

Elevating and Innovating at Home

This summer **Camp Invention** was very different, but thanks to the innovative spirit of the national non-profit organization *Invent Now*, they designed a Camp Invention Kit to meet the safety challenges due to Covid-19. VVS had 269 elementary and middle school students participate in our *Elevate at Home* Camp Invention! Campers could choose to be totally self-directed as they worked on their inventions independently or decide at any time to use the support videos located on the Camp Invention website. Family members of all ages could join in the self-paced design challenges as well. Some of the highlights of the kits were:

<u>Flight Lab</u> - Campers experimented with the principles of flight such as lift and drag as they investigated the inner working of their high-tech simulation robot.

<u>Champions</u> - Campers designed and built the ultimate sports complex and followed directions to add simple machines into the games in their sports complex.

<u>Design Thinking</u> - Campers learned about intellectual property rights as they became entrepreneurs as they sketched designs, built prototypes, designed logos, and pitched their products.

Rescue Squad - Campers became environmental experts as they designed and created an energy efficient LED plant, created parachutes to safely airdrop beavers, and worked to restore the balance of nature in the environment.



Windows & Doors

Increase fresh air circulation when feasible.



Controlled Traffic Patterns

Reduction of bi-directional foot traffic in hallways and stairwells, including signage and distance markers where practical and appropriate.



Additional nursing and custodial positions have been added to assist with increased health and cleaning/sanitization needs.

Isolation Rooms

Available for individuals who may be displaying symptoms while awaiting pickup.



School Buses

Facial masks required to be worn at all times and social distancing maintained to the greatest extent practicable. Staggered runs to reduce capacity and controlled release with multiple school entry points employed to reduce congregation.

Multiple Entry Points
Where feasible to reduce bottlenecks.



Face Coverings

Face masks are required. Accommodations will be made, with proper medical documentation. Specific ways in which face coverings and partitions will be used in schools, individual classrooms or with individual students and grade levels, including developmental and medical feasibility, will continue to be explored and articulated.

If we've succeeded in even a modicum of that task, we owe that to the success in the months prior when we created something special. A school family. A community that could rely on itself, that could flourish even in isolation." Maintaining and building upon the strong bond between home and school, easing fears brought on by this crisis, and bringing some smiles to our students and families were major priorities as we forged ahead with remote learning. One way we solidified community between home and school was through our partnered themed-weeks.

The conceptualization of themed-weeks typically began with our "Fun Committee," made up of teachers and the principal, who met every week virtually and determined the theme of the following week in advance. We then shared the theme with families through a Peachjar announcement and flyer. To promote the theme further, we had a premiere, usually in the form of an engaging video, which was revealed on our very popular Facebook page. For example, one week was dedicated to showing gratitude and thanks to essential workers by posting signs on lawns, windows, and doors, while another week was dedicated to a celebration of Earth Day. One of our most popular weeks was devoted to a Food Network theme whereby families, staff, and faculty shared recipes and cooking/baking videos or pictures. Regardless of the theme, students, families, and teachers alike shared pictures and videos reflective of the theme, which were then posted on our Facebook page. The positive Facebook page reactions and comments from our families, though from afar, helped to bring us together at a time when we needed one another the most.


